
COS Men's Club Super Bowl Fundraiser

COS Men's Club and the World Wide Wrap

The annual World Wide Wrap is scheduled for Sunday, February 7, 2021, starting at 9:00 am. Due to the pandemic, the Wrap will be held virtually by accessing the regular Sunday morning minyan link. Early in the month of February of each year, men and women in Conservative/Masorti communities around the world gather together to pray. The mitzvah of wrapping tefillin will be shared, encouraged and taught. For many years Rabbi Kay and Cantor Robuck have illustrated the history of tefillin and the proper (and often unique) ways of putting on tefillin, including the appropriate prayers, at the morning minyan.

COS Men's Club Bridge Group

The COS Men's Club has started an online Bridge group and ALL are welcome. It requires internet access and a laptop/computer to access the website and play – the screens on cell phones are too small. We play this while on a Zoom call so we can kibbitz while we play. The Zoom can be on a cell phone or most of the players can simply leave the Zoom app open in background on the same device we play on. Bridge requires 4 people to play and no real experience is required – we can teach you. If you already know how to play spades, then you know half the rules. We break players into tables of 4 and move each group into separate Zoom rooms to keep the Zoom noise down while playing. We use BridgeBase.com to play. A free account must be created on this website.

Go to BridgeBase.com and register for your free BBO (bridge base online) ID and password. Once you create an account, send Jim Tinkoff (jtinkoff@cfl.rr.com) or Andy Rosen (andy@pineloch.com) an email with your BridgeBase ID, your email address, telephone number and if you able to play. If both you and your spouse are playing, let us know if you want to play as partners. Send the email before 5:00 PM Sunday so that we can arrange tables and select a "Host" for each table. The table listing will be sent out on Monday to include a listing of members and tables. Andy will send out a Zoom request to be used while playing.

Currently, the Bridge Group meets on Tuesdays at 4:00 PM. Emails are sent out the Monday before with the table/partner assignments. If you are interested, let us know and we will contact you with more details.

- In high school, I was a member of Sigma Alpha Rho fraternity. Our Men's Club co-President, Elliott Davis, was also a Sigma Alpha Rho fraternity brother, in Montreal. What a coincidence!!
- I met my wife lleene at the synagogue we were both attending.
- I worked for the Department of Defense in Philadelphia.
- I attended the JCC sponsored youth leadership program and was taught how to run an effective meeting, stressing Parliamentary Procedure.

Editor's questions:

Your involvement in the Men's Club and the synagogue is a true example of volunteerism. You were involved with your Men's Club in Philadelphia. What programs that were successful in Philadelphia can be brought to COS?

I was President of my Men's Club in Philadelphia for 3 years. The Men's Club had a very strong bond with Sisterhood. The Men's Club held monthly general meetings featuring speakers from government, media and the medical field. A full course dinner was offered at a low cost and was well attended by both Men's Club & Sisterhood members. We also had several large fund raisers. A (secular) New Year's Eve Dinner & Dance, featuring a full course sit down dinner and a Sweetheart Dance in February were examples of successful programs that generated funds that went directly towards the synagogue's mortgage.

You took on an additional role as leader & coordinator of the COS Seniors. Why was this important to you and do you plan to revive it?

As members of COS, I joined the Men's Club & the COS Seniors and became treasurer of the COS Seniors. Bernie Raff, z'l asked me to succeed him as president, which I accepted. The COS Seniors had monthly Sunday afternoon programs featuring musical entertainment. I had several professional musical contacts in the community and expanded that to include performers throughout Florida. Attendance at these monthly events started to decrease due to the same programs being held at local ALFs. I reached out to Andy Rosen to help start and administer a monthly BINGO. Attendance was good until COVID-19 took over. Virtual BINGO was thought of as an alternative, without success. The COS Seniors program is now on hold, but there are plans for it to return once the COVID-19 crisis is over. COS has an obligation to serve our entire Jewish community & the COS Seniors helps fill this gap.

B'Ri'ut – Substance Abuse Program

The COS Men's Club, in collaboration with fourteen local Jewish organizations, have recognized a need for a program that addresses substance abuse. We all feel an urgency to move quickly to get this program up and running. We have invited all community Rabbis, Cantors, Educators, and Executive Directors.

B'ri'ut is Hebrew for "acceptance". Our objective is to provide a forum for discussion, dissemination of information and provide support to our community to help prevent substance use disorders, provide support groups for those in need, and provide reference information for those looking for support. We hope to encourage the community to more openly discuss substance use disorder issues and thereby reduce the stigma and embarrassment felt by many in our community.

The approach to **B'ri'ut** will be scheduled in multiple programs. The **first** program will take the front line personnel (those who have contact with members of their organization, congregants, etc.) and provide orientation and education at a 1/2 day session, scheduled for Thursday, March 4th, focusing on how to recognize substance use disorders. We will include guest speakers who have dealt with substance use situations. The **second** portion will be a full day, scheduled for Sunday, March 7th and will include training on how to interact and deal with someone needing assistance. Both sessions will be led by certified trainers.

In parallel with this program, we plan to develop a Social Media program for college students and young adults. Most of them are knowledgeable of the issues and have attended many lectures on this subject. They are looking for assistance but not in a group setting. We will also produce a referral guide; indicating where someone would go for assistance, if needed.

Following this initial program & training, the **B'ri'ut** committee will schedule community-wide sessions on substance use disorders, with the objective of reaching all facets of our community and facilitating discussions to eliminate the stigma and sense of embarrassment too often felt in the community when confronted with a family member or friend with substance use problems.

We will be forming support groups for our Jewish community who are struggling with issues regarding substance use disorders. These groups will be established for various age groups and will be led by community members who will be trained to facilitate. Those that have suffered and/or recovered will make the best group leaders.

We also plan to provide initial funding of Narcan (a medication that counteracts opioid overdoses) to all organizations to have on hand, just in case.
